Why Jesus Made People Angry

hy did Jesus make people angry?
Jesus often taught about the law and the Sabbath, but in the eyes of many, He appeared to break both—and it made them very angry. For instance, in Luke 14, Jesus was invited to eat at the house of a Pharisee on

the Sabbath day, and among the guests sat a man with abnormal swelling in his body. Jesus asked if it was lawful to

heal on the Sabbath and then proceeded to heal him. In Luke 5, Jesus healed a man and then asked him to pick up his mat and carry it home, which, in those days, was considered doing work on the Sabbath. While Jesus transformed lives everywhere He went, He simultaneously made

others very frustrated and angry. So, what caused so much frustration and anger?

I believe that people were angry with Jesus because they had confused the law—that is, the Ten Commandments—with the values that help us to be faithful to the law. Moreover, they had lost the flexibility to adjust those values based on the circumstances. Jesus, however, had absolute clarity about the law, about the values of the law, and when it was best to reprioritize values. This is why Jesus could say, "If one of you has a child or an ox that falls into a well on the Sabbath day, will you not immediately pull it out?" (Luke 14:5, NIV). In other words, doing no work on the Sabbath is a good value, but if a life is at stake, in that moment, the value of sustaining a life must be reprioritized over not doing work.

Good leaders have clarity about the law and the values of the law, and they know when those values need to be quickly reprioritized. Let me give you an example of how this often plays out in modern day. I once knew of a lady who faithfully attended church each Sabbath. She always—and I mean always—sat in the same seat, except on the day a new visitor came to church earlier than she did and sat where she always sat. Do you know what she did when she saw him? Rather than find another seat, she marched right over to him and tapped him on the shoulder and asked him to move to another seat so she could sit there. Now, I appreciate her devotion to her

seat. After all, it was her seat in the sense that during a capital campaign she actually paid for that pew. But in this instance, the value of devotion to her seat took precedence over the value of hospitality. Unfortunately, in that moment, she was not able to reprioritize her values and ultimately

offended the guest who was looking for a hospitable church. Things might have turned out better if she would have reprioritized hospitality over devotion to her seat.

Jesus often taught about the need to reprioritize values. In the parable of the lost sheep, Jesus taught that a good shepherd always prioritizes faithfulness to the 100 sheep, unless one of the sheep gets lost. At that moment, the good shepherd quickly reprioritizes seeking for the one sheep over faithfulness to the 99. Jesus had absolute clarity about which values are more important based on the changing circumstances. Good Christian leaders need to make sure they do the same. Good leaders also help other leaders clarify when it's appropriate to reprioritize values so that we treat others the way Jesus taught us to do. ●

Attendees heard a lecture from Marta Heras, business administrator for Mis Hermanos Pequeñitos, and a specialized team performed ultrasound examinations of the breast, thyroid, prostate, and more. Another team explained self-examination, its importance, and how to carry it out. Participants were also able to touch the prostheses that simulate cancerous nodules.


