Christian Leadership

hristian leadership centers on love and is built on service—though to lead is different than love, and it's beyond mere service. Much is said about what it means to lead and even more is written on leadership. My reflection seeks to pull us back a bit from the

noise and confusion that surrounds this idea.

To lead starts with being led. Christ the Good Shepherd, whose comprehensive program of feeding, watering, sheltering, protecting, disciplining, and seeking the lost sheep offers a model for raising families at home and church. In this mode of leadership, needs are answered and we learn to hear the voice of the One who calls us each by name. The practice of hearing the Shepherd's voice

and distinguishing it from the aural clutter around us means learning to discern. Discernment must involve identifying what is true. Here, I'm speaking of what is true in all of life, including acknowledging that our knowing is limited.

To *lead* isn't what we occasionally do! Rather, it's how we're constantly being formed in the context of our foibles and our humanness. Leading understood this way might well revolutionize the Christian church. This honest and contextualized truth-seeking applies equally to all spheres of knowing

— whether religion or science, politics or commerce. This is the kind of character-forming truth-seeking that, when set in the diversity that is part of God's design, grows us in the image and likeness of our Creator and Redeemer! It involves the whole of our lived lives.

To *lead* takes us *toward* something. To be led is to be brought through the promptings of the Spirit into a relationship with Christ and all creation, to exhibit and work out of the gifts that are given by the Spirit, and to reflect the fruits that

come with the gifts given through this same Spirit. It seems obvious, and yet, I would say it's rare, too. To legitimately *lead* requires a spiritual foundation. The disciplines that form Christian character need tending to more than ever! The Spirit guides us toward an integrated understanding of reality—not limited to Christian jargon ("Adventese" in our case), or forms of "faith" that belie substance.

To *lead* may or may not involve positional leadership. It

always involves the choice to be humbled by the grace we constantly receive; to see ourselves aright in relationship to others—for we are all beloved children of God; and to act responsively to the Christ represented by those in need before us. In other words, Christians are led to live out the self-sacrificing love of Christ. We are to lead lives that are informed by this vital tenet of our faith!

May the Spirit move, Christ be revealed, and the Father be glorified as you love, serve, and lead! ●


