Let God Leve You

heard the story of a man who commented to a pastor, "I don't believe in God. I'm an atheist." The pastor wasn't shocked by the statement but simply replied, "Would you describe for me the kind of God you don't believe in?" So, he began. And when he finished, the

pastor replied, "That makes me an atheist

too because I don't believe in the kind of God you describe either."

The Bible says in 1 John 4:8, "God is love." Now it doesn't say God is loving. He is loving, but it says, "God is love." It doesn't say, love is god. There is a big difference. It's like saying, "My dog is a girl" or "My girl is a dog." How you say it makes a difference.

Scripture often articulates this very embodiment being love. In 1 John 4:16 (NIV) we read, "We know and rely on the love God has for us. God is love." Romans 5:8 (NKIV) pro-

claims, "But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us." 1 John 4:19 (KJV) states, "We love him, because he first loved us." Ephesians 2:4 (NKIV) adds, "But God, who is rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loves us." And then Jeremiah declares, "Yes, I have loved you with an everlasting love; Therefore with lovingkindness I have drawn you" (Jeremiah 31:3, NKJV).

The apostle Paul shares with us the dimensions of God

who is love. He writes, "I pray that you...[will] grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ" (Ephesians 3:17-18, NIV). These are four dimensions of God's love: "wide... long...high...deep."

First, God's love is wide enough to include everybody. John 3:16 (NIV) declares, "God so loved the world." Not just the church—but the entire world. God loves everybody you meet this week, the unlovely and the lovely. The good news is that God loves you. The bad news is that He loves your enemies just as much. His love is wide enough to include everyone.

Secondly, God's love is long enough to last forever.

Jeremiah declares, "I have loved you with an everlasting love" (Jeremiah 31:3, NKJV), and the Psalmist writes, "I will tell them, 'God's love can always be trusted, and his faithfulness lasts as long as the heavens" (Psalm 89:2,

That is so different from human love. Human love wears out. But since "God is love," there is an everlasting reservoir of love that flows for all to experience. God's love never wears out. His love is patient, persistent, and

persevering. God loves you on your good days. He loves you on your bad days because His love is unconditional.

Thirdly, God's love is high enough to be everywhere. Paul, when describing this love in Romans 8:38-39 (NIV), writes, "For I am convinced that...neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

There is no place that you can go where God's love isn't. Nothing, no circumstance, no situation can separate you

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because God's love is everywhere. His love lasts forever, and His love is everywhere.

Lastly, God's love is deep enough to meet my needs. The Psalmist writes, "For I am poor and needy; I am hurt to the depths of my heart" (Psalm 109:22, GNT). Some of us have broken and wounded hearts because of something that happened in the past. God's love is deep enough to bind even these deepest wounds.

In Deuteronomy 33:27 (TLB), we read, "The eternal God is your refuge and underneath you are the everlasting arms." When you hit the bottom, God is underneath the bottom! Drop into His arms of love. Let Him catch you and support you when you have nowhere else to go. His love is deep enough to catch you no matter how far down you go.

When you go to Jesus Christ and say, "Jesus, how much do you love me?" He stretches out His arms on the cross and says, "I love you this much." His love is so wide that no one is excluded; so long that it lasts forever; so high that it can find you no matter where you are; and it is so deep that it can reach the deepest wounds and problems in your life. So, I invite you right now to let God love you.
